We would like to take this opportunity to extend our warmest thanks to the Commune of Bursinel for hosting the event and making the hall available. We would also like to thank all the members of our Foundation Board who helped us during the day.

It's impossible to sum up Lakhphuti in just 2 sentences, because her life is a real adventure that even the Nepalese can't imagine! For those who weren't able to attend, I'd like to remind you that Lakhphuti was only able to go to school for a few months in her early childhood. Her parents needed her at home, and it was mostly the girls who made the sacrifice.

This suffering naturally led Lakhphuti to turn her life towards helping others, particularly in terms of the freedom that education brings.

As a reminder, 11 years ago, the Nepalese Government hired Lakhphuti as a member of the Nepal Mountain Academy committee. When she arrived, there were 8 months' unpaid rent and 6 months' unpaid wages! Lakhputi was acutely aware of this problem, which she took on head-on, because she's not the kind of person to just sit back and watch! So she rolled up her sleeves and for 4 years she battled between the ministries of finance and tourism and the private sector to convince them to create this high-level mountaineering academy combining theory and practice. This academy is now recognised worldwide and the members of the government have finally realised the extent to which this training is valued and worthwhile.

We are delighted and proud to announce that Dolma Lakhpa has passed her Bachelor's degree at the Nepal Mountain Academy with the highest mark, 4 out of 4, after 4 years of study. In view of this excellent result, we have granted Dolma Lakhpa permission to continue her university studies for a further 2 years to obtain a Master's degree, which is also unique and recognised worldwide.

Between the ongoing Covid-19 epidemic and the arrival of dengue fever due to global warming, which has made the climate wetter and warmer, making it easier for the tiger mosquito to spread, a prolonged visit to Kathmandu is not ideal. Brigitte is allergic to antibiotics and a local illness would be very problematic.

We have therefore decided to postpone our trip to Nepal once again.

However, Lakhphuti, the founder in Nepal, came twice this year, enabling us to discuss and resolve the various problems we encountered on the ground. One of her visits enabled us to organise a meeting between donors and Lakhphuti for those who were able to attend the event in Bursinel. Her speech aroused a great deal of interest and emotion. The aim was to introduce you to this exceptional woman with a huge heart and an impressive will to succeed.

We monitor the children's progress through regular contact with our local team. They are putting a lot of effort into their studies and have passed their annual exams. We are now in the phase of choosing their professional future, which depends on their ability to study. For those who have more difficulty, we are guiding them towards the equivalent of an apprenticeship so that they can obtain a diploma enabling them to work in a profession that interests them. A few particularly gifted students will have the opportunity to go on to higher education, including one of our girls who wants to be a biologist and who really has what it takes if she keeps up the momentum until she passes the Nepalese Maturité exams.

On the financial front, it's important to stress the impact of what's happening around the world on food and energy costs, etc. Fortunately, thanks to your generosity and strict control of our spending, we're managing to cope. Here again, the work of Lakhphuti is decisive.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank you all very warmly for your constant support, which has been essential to our success for over twenty years. Your help has enabled children to acquire solid knowledge and to train for a career of their choice. Many thanks on their behalf.
